In the last few decades, soil science has contributed greatly to the discussion on climatic and environmental changes, as well as to various topics of human impact on landscape and environment. Nowadays, vast amounts of soil data are collected in a large range of study fields. In many countries soil studies are systematically integrated into archaeological investigations. Moreover, in some countries this methodology is legally required research protocol, as for example in Belgium since 2016. This geoarchaeological approach enables the better understanding and anticipation of complex and fragile interactions between societies and their environments.

The meeting aims to address these complex issues and demonstrate how they are handled and unravelled through past and current interdisciplinary research.

Preliminary programme

6.11.2019 – Scientific field excursion

The excursion will travel from Bruges through the Polder area to the Belgian coast. The medieval town of Bruges developed on the verge of the cover sands with the tidal landscapes to the north. This landscape position was in many aspects an advantage but was a challenge for trade, as Bruges was accessible only through a highly dynamic system of tidal gullies. Export and import occurred through a system of trade hubs along the tidal gullies. During the excursion the importance and wealth of this extended harbour system will be highlighted, the position of some of these trade hubs will be visited with an emphasis on the landscape dynamics and the complex soilscape.

7.11.2019 - Scientific meeting

At the Groeningemuseum (Dijver 12, 8000 Bruges) in the heart of Bruges.

The questions raised during this meeting are:

What is the current state of research on soils as a record of past and present? How has soil research contributed to important archaeological insights? How do formerly collected soil data help us today? Can we still learn from nature through field observation? Is there still time to do fieldwork? What are some of the future challenges?

A series of prominent speakers from all over Europe will present their work, views and insights on these topics. To conclude, Em. Prof. Roger Langohr will give the keynote presentation.

Participants are invited to contribute to the discussion and to present their research results in the form of posters or scientific articles to be integrated in a publication to be edited for this meeting. Research results inspired by the holistic soil study approach and improving the understanding of the book of nature through field observation of soils are welcomed.

Publication

At the occasion of this meeting we intend to publish a book. This book will include the articles proposed by the keynote speakers, the articles or abstracts of posters presented during the meeting, and scientific articles relevant to this event proposed by other participants of the meeting. The articles published will be peer-reviewed.

The book will be printed in limited edition and distributed during the meeting. Moreover, the book will be published electronically in open-access form, with an individual digital object identifier (doi) for each paper and the full copyright of each author for his own paper.
